The pictures are black-and-white, but very crisp and clear. This book rather supposes that you have some basic handsewing knowledge, but is still easy enough to use that beginning embroiderers will find it helpful. If you are a visual learner, this book will be nice, because it has step-by-step drawings on how to create each basic stitch, though the variations of each stitch are often not as well illustrated. If you prefer to have things explained by descriptions, rather than pictures, you will likely be at a loss, as there is almost no text in this book aside from the names of the stitches. I love this book, and enjoy looking through the photos, and planning embroidery projects I will likely never get around to. It gives some creative ideas for how to use the different stitches, as well.
